GRASS WITHERS O the FLOWERS FADE, BUT THE WORD of our GOD stands FOREVER. ISAIAH 40 B NLT



As we are entering the month of October, we hope the weather will finally begin to cool off and feel more fall-like. The days are getting shorter, and the leaves, due to the drought, began changing color weeks ago. It is the time of Friday night football games, pumpkins, hay-rides and fall festivals.

Farmers usually harvest their crops in the fall during the month of October, but again the drought has changed the schedule and the amount of the harvest. We need to pray for our farmers as they continue their harvests, that God will provide what they need to carry them over until next year and pray that next year's harvest is bountiful. We need to remember that with all the advances in technology, equipment and science, it is still God who provides the ground, the rain, the sun, the essentials for crops to grow, and for life itself.

I know I have used the Parable of the Rich Fool as an illustration for this point before, but I believe it has value if we review it again. This parable speaks to the issue of the true source of our blessings and the resources for crops and harvest.

Jesus tells the parable in Luke 12:16-21. And He told them a parable saying, "The land of a rich man produced plentifully, and he thought to himself, 'What shall I do, for I have nowhere to store my crops?' And he said, 'I will do this: I will tear down my barns and build larger ones, and there I will store all my grain and my goods. And I will say to my soul, "Soul, you have ample goods laid up for many years; relax, eat, drink, be merry." But God said to him, 'Fool! This night your soul is required of you, and the things you have prepared, whose will they be?' So is the one who lays up treasure for himself and is not rich toward God."

Let me first address what this parable is NOT saying. The parable is not saying that it is wrong to save and prepare for the future. The parable is not saying that it is wrong to build for retirement. The truth is, that in years like this one, it reveals the necessity to follow God's guidance and save for instances such as this year's drought. What the parable addresses is our focus. We are to realize that the source of all we have, and the source of the crops is God. God has blessed us so that we may bless others.

We need to notice that the barns of the farmer in the parable were already full before the harvest. He had already stored up and saved for the future before God blessed him so richly with the current year's crop.

Again, God had blessed him so that he could in turn share the blessing with others, those who may be in need. This farmer, however, thought only of himself and did not acknowledge the true source of all he had been given by God.

This ties in with our current sermon series from the Book of Acts, in which we have been studying about the early church. In the early church, during the time of the apostles, the members of the church shared generously from their resources so that there was no one in need among the community of believers.

It is a true blessing for the Greenville First United Methodist Church, that so many of our members have understood what the 'Rich Fool' did not, and continue the ministry of sharing as found in the Book of Acts in the early church. So many of our members during their working years understood that the money they were earning to live on and save for the future was a gift from God. During their working years they gave to the church to support its ministries, as well as gave of their time and talents in service to the church.

Now that many of our members are retired, they still give from the financial resources God blessed them with, as well as giving of their time and talents.

As pastor of First UMC, I am thankful for God's blessings from a personal standpoint, and for the church. God has richly blessed His church with those who have laid up their treasures for Him and His Church.
